With recent advances in automation and a shifting frontier in digital technologies, labor markets have undergone a substantial transformation towards what has often been referred to as "modern work": away from more physical, repetitive tasks towards analytical thinking, teamwork and creative problem solving. This transition begets new challenges for our



understanding of the workplace. This short conference, funded by the Dutch Research Council (NWO), brings together economists whose work investigates the implications of a changing work environment on workers, managers, entrepreneurs, and society at large.
