## What could be improved in the course?:

- Not taking it online. At least until some bugs are fixed.
- More explanation in class of the formulas. Maybe the Professor could add examples in the slides.
- Since this course features a lot of models that include calculations, a lot has to be featured on the slides. This sometimes makes them messy to read, and difficult to understand if you happened to miss a lecture and want to read up. I would like to see an example of how to use each model clearly (on a seperate document if needed), so that we don't have to try and decode slides after the fact.
- material is overlapping with the behavioral economics and psychology subject of the block prior to this one
- The goal of the research project could be explained a little better as well as the professors' expectations in general.
- · could look at more more applied research
- the slides could be a bit more clear when calculating utility functions, for example in de classes about risk preferences
- More stress on understanding the models by solving problems similar to those given in the assignments.
- The smaller assignments were not made with the large size of groups in mind.
- Some of the equations presented in lecture were difficult to understand. I found myself having to guess my way through them at home to try and
  figure out how we got from one step to the next. Would be helpful to go through them on the board in lecture.
- Gijs sometimes misses questions from some parts of the class. Otherwise great lectures.
- Some of the assignments were a bit tedious- I think it was the first assignment where we were expected to do the same calculation over and over
  again (what am I learning?). I also don't think that the assignments tested our intuition enough- I feel like I did the calculations, but then wasn't ever
  asked to interpret them.
- Both lecturers tend to speak too fast and they did not explain some concepts clearly enough. They actually make you think that they want to finish the lecture as soon as possible. This is a pity since in person they are quite nice and helpful, and the course is very interesting overall. A bit more explanations about some formulas or calculations would be very useful. The assignments are great, but for our projects we could have discussed them more during the class in order to better understand what we were exactly supposed to do. A greater budget would be great, too. The lecture hours could be distributed in a better way. There were lectures really dense, in terms of material, while during some others we did not even use the whole 90'. More balance is needed, and this last week, instead of stopping the lectures, we could do some revision or exam practice.
